In the middle of Luke's Gospel (9.51) we read, "When the days drew near for him to be taken up, he set his face to go to Jerusalem." By repeatedly reminding us that Jesus is on a journey to his crucifixion Luke provides a sense of what it means to follow Christ. During the season of Lent we are on a journey that leads to Holy Week and Easter. In this class we will journey with Christ and explore how that journey can deepen our everyday walk with Christ. No homework is required for the course, but participants are encouraged to read the Gospel of Luke and to have read up through the ninth chapter before the course begins.

NICENE CREED

Celebrant and people

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.
